Over 100 national, regional and local artists play a mix of free and ticketed shows at a dozen venues throughout the area, with the marquee event being the two-day concert at Francis Field on September 21 and 22.

In partnership with the St. Johns County Tourist Development Council, Sing Out Loud was introduced in September 2016. Guided by its core values of music, community and philanthropy, Sing Out Loud has featured more than 1,300 national, regional and local musicians and raised over \$300,000 for local non-profit organizations.

"Hurley Hilton" under renovation

After housing numerous priests, bishops and other religious leaders of the Catholic Church during the past 60 years, the Cathedral Parish rectory located adjacent to the Cathedral Basilica of St. Augustine at 38 Cathedral Place in downtown St. Augustine, is undergoing a four million dollar renovation.

The 14,000-square-foot rectory, built in 1965 under the guidance of Archbishop Joseph Patrick Hurley during a period of rapid growth, has housed numerous priests, including the current residents: Pastor Father John Tetlow, Father Mac Hill, Father Ignatius Yeruva, and occasionally Bishop Erik Pohlmeier.

Father Hurley was an American prelate of the Roman Catholic Church. He served as Bishop of the Diocese of St. Augustine in Florida from 1940 until his death in 1967.

Nicknamed the "Hurley Hilton," the rectory once served as a dormitory for the many priests recruited by Archbishop Hurley to support new parishes statewide. Financial constraints and other church maintenance priorities deferred the project for many years. Now, with critical repairs becoming unavoidable, Father Tetlow is moving forward with

improvements and renovations.

The renovations aim to respect the rectory's historical and architectural heritage while upgrading essential systems. A significant portion of the work addresses the original 1965 electrical, plumbing and windows, and also the HVAC issues that have caused ongoing leaks and air-quality problems. Additionally, the floor plan is being reconfigured and expanded to separate the priest's living quarters from the parish office and ministry spaces. Construction and improvements which began in early July are expected to last eight months. Jacksonville contractor Auld & White was selected for the construction.

Once completed the building will include 8 new offices for parish priests and staff, expanded Verot Room to accommodate meetings and small gatherings, new staff break room and warming kitchen, new reception area, two new handicap accessible bathrooms on first floor, plus upgrade of one existing bathroom, new residential kitchen and expanded great room on the second floor for priest use, new balcony on second floor accessible from the great room and overlooking (continued on page 7)

Layering

This month's essay features layers that are different from the layers of a cake, though the topic may to some readers seem as "dry" as a confection made of sawdust. And while my theme here is, I hope, significant, it's hard to attach to it bells, whistles and disco dance hall flashing lights to make it festive and interesting. But time to stop apologizing and begin the baking.

"Layering" is a condition that cities commonly experience, either as part of the normal budget cycle, or in order to escape the unwanted notoriety of rut-ism as in "we never do anything new here." Cities don't want to be known as non-happening places best described as stale and 'old-fashioned". One way to escape such a dreadful fate is to add new projects and services to the ones a city already is providing. This is often done to prove that a city is up to date on the latest best practices or glitzy gizmos, or when wellmeaning residents suggest to their elected officials new projects or services that they believe will move the city up the quality-of-life scale.

Well and good, except... the undertaking of new projects, the adding of new services, are often done without attention to their longterm effect on the city's budget other than the initial expenditure to, say, construct a new sidewalk or purchase a new sanitation truck to replace an aging vehicle. The projects are done, the new vehicle "budget creep" this will cause. Thus, budget.

what the City must maintain (insure, repair) grows and grows, often without adding money to the budget to pay for that growth of expenses. Property taxes aren't raised, fees aren't increased, no new sources of money are found. The inevitable then happens: The city's budget is squeezed, sometimes to the point that a city commission either must use cash reserves to pay for normal operations or must postpone to later fiscal years needed repair of existing assets. But such postponement simply postpones (what else?) the inevitable: repairs eventually must be done, aging vehicles must be replaced, money has to be spent. Budgeting-by-deferring forces the city to manage its finances on a slippery slope indeed, and with each year of postponing the angle of the slope becomes steeper and steeper. How, then, to avoid the squeeze and the slippery slope?

Simply reduce spending or increase taxes you'll declare. Ah, Simply reduce if it only were that simple. Perhaps a more proactive way would be to have a program, perhaps developed using artificial intelligence, which would provide a clear guide of the cumulative effect on a city's budget as projects and services are added over time. The elected leaders could then evaluate whether a new project should be done or perhaps delayed until an existing project is finished or an existing service is no longer needed. This could then make is bought or the new services are money available for a new project implemented without concern for the or service without "layering" the

The City Commission held its regular monthly meeting on August 5, 2024, and took the following actions:

1, Approved a proclamation to recognize the graduation of the one hundredth veteran from the St. Johns County Veterans Treatment Court.

2. Approved two resolutions: the first to set the base rate for the annual stormwater utility fee for the average single-family home at \$200 (reduced from \$224.40) with credit for private subdivisions that maintain their own drainage system. The second resolution is to approve the terms and conditions Collector to implement the stormwater staugbch.com.

3. Passed on first reading an 2024, the Commission discussed the the City's General Code for stormwater

management

4. Approved an eightunit hotel to be built on the southwest corner of E Street and A1A Beach Boulevard.

5. Re-appointed Mr. Hulsey Bray to a three-

year term on the Comprehensive Planning and Zoning Board.

6. Tabled approval of a resolution to adopt a preservation agreement with the State of Florida for a grant that will provide money to renovate part of the interior of the former City Hall adjacent to the pier park.

7. Did not approve a proposal to provide public Wi Fi in the Commission

meeting room.

8. Approved legislative priorities for 2025 that will be submitted to the Northeast Florida Regional Council.

The City Commission will next meet on Monday, September 9, 2024, with a hearing on the property tax millage and budget for Fiscal Year 2025. The budget hearing will begin at 5:01 p.m., the regular meeting at 6 p.m. The public is invited to attend both of an agreement with the County Tax meetings, or may view them online at


St. Augustine Beach Hotel Added to NPS Civil Rights Network

The National Park Service recognizes the St. Augustine Beach Hotel & Beachfront by including it on the African American Civil Rights Network (AACRN) for its significant role in the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Sites on the AACRN offer a comprehensive overview of the people, places, and events associated with the African American Civil Rights Movement.

Designed by St. Augustine architect Francis Hollingsworth, the St. Augustine

Beach Hotel is one of two remaining structures from the St. Augustine Auxiliary Pier Project constructed in 1939-1940 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). mirror-image hotel was located north of a wooden fishing pier originally constructed in the approximate location of the St. Johns County Ocean Pier. A seawall and boardwalk were also constructed as part of the WPA project.



The St. Augustine Beach

Hotel and the pier, now known as Pier Park, quickly became one of the most popular beach access points. Business generated by Pier Park played a key role in the economic development of the community of St. Augustine Beach. The building exterior is made of coquina, a local stone formed from deposits of shells accumulated over thousands of years. Coquina was quarried from Anastasia Island by enslaved Africans to construct the Castillo de San Marcos. Its use as a building material continued but was relatively limited by the mid-20th century, requiring reopening of the quarries for the construction of the hotels.

În 2022 the St. Augustine Beach Hotel was listed on the National Register of Historic Places for its national significance related to the passage of the Civil

Rights Act of 1964.





Deadline for Home Owners to Appeal Property Values is September 10th

of the Circuit Court and County Comptroller's office wants to remind residents that the annual St. Johns County Value Adjustment Board (VAB) petition filing period begins on Aug. 16 and runs through Sept. 10.

'Our Minutes and Records Division plays a vital role in the VAB process," said John Rundgren, Clerk Designee. "We ensure residents have the necessary resources to file appeals related to their property assessments, schedule value hearings, and maintain records of the

proceedings.

The Truth in Millage or TRIM notice is the most important property tax document you receive from our office," said Property Appraiser Eddie Creamer. "The TRIM notice will be mailed on August 16, 2024. This starts a 25-day period that you may request an informal conference with the Property Appraiser's office to address any questions or concerns you have about your property. Should we not be able to reach an agreement on your concerns during this period, the VAB is the next step in the process.

will Residents soon receive Truth in Millage (TRIM) notices, office at (904) 819-3600.

St. Johns County Clerk detailing their property's assessed and market values. The TRIM notice outlines proposed property taxes and assessments, including any applicable exemptions. Property owners who disagree with their property's assessed value, classification, or exemption status are encouraged to file a petition with the VAB.

The VAB operates independently from the Property Appraiser and Tax Collector. It is composed of five members: two from the Board of County Commissioners, one from the County's school board, and two citizen representatives. The board is responsible for hearing appeals related to the denial of exemptions and classifications, property assessments, and ad valorem tax deferrals.

Petitions may be submitted online, by mail, or in person at the Richard Watson Judicial Center, located at 4010 Lewis Speedway, St. Augustine, FL 32084. In-person petitions must be received by 5:00 PM on Sept. 10, while online petitions can be submitted until 11:59 PM on the same day. 

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

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What is Blood Flow Restriction

Blood Flow Restriction, or BFR exercise is not new. In fact, as with many treatments, even penicillin, it was discovered by Yoshiaki Sato, a Japanese accident. exercise enthusiast noticed swelling in his leg after prolonged kneeling and recognized the same feeling in his legs he experienced while working out. From this experience, he developed what he called KAATSU, or "training with added pressure". He applied these principles to his own rehabilitation in 1973 after experiencing severe injury to his legs and made a wonderful recovery.

Fast forwarding, his methods became popular in the body building community of the 1970's, which led to preliminary research up through the 90's. This was followed by a research explosion in the early 2000's as the technique increased in popularity. It gained increased notoriety from professional sports and related media coverage.

Fortunately, for us today, the research has produced a sizeable body of knowledge, and brought more consistency to equipment standards and treatment protocols. And although BFR is not a cure-all, nothing is, there is a strong scientific basis for using BFR treatments, not just in sports but also in rehabilitation.

Muscle strength and hypertrophy, or any tissue, depends on progressive loading. Targeted tissue is challenged by increasing loads producing mechanical tension, muscle microtrauma and metabolic stress. In return, the body adapts with increased density or increased strength. Historically, progressive loading meant using high loads (>80% 1 max rep or 80% of what can be lifted 1x), repeating to the point of fatigue/failure. But higher loads have also meant injury to both the healthy athlete and those trying to heal through rehabilitation. But what if the same results could be achieved, generating the same positive adaptations using much lower loads? If applied correctly, BFR, using exercise loads 20-30% 1 max rep, can produce similar results – muscle fatigue, increased metabolites, and increased growth hormone – with less chance of tissue damage

Without getting too technical, but in case you were curious, these results are achieved

by partially and temporarily restricting blood flow with pressurized cuffs. The restriction promotes an inflammatory response similarly seen using heavy weights. inflammatory response causes the production of myokines, which are cytokines produced in skeletal muscle. One specific cytokine, interleukin 6 (IL-6), is responsible for the acute phase of protein synthesis. And what is of particular interest, muscle damage is not required to bring about increased levels of IL-6. Additionally, it is hypothesized that muscle fatigue from BFR triggers a higher motor unit recruitment earlier in the exercise, which results in greater muscle activation, similarly produced when using higher loads.

What are the downside and safety considerations? Your therapists should do a thorough examination, including a medical history, to ensure BFR is indicated for your condition. But if indicated and if applied correctly, the most common side effect is muscle soreness as with most types of

BFR is a proven training option for the athlete but is also making waves in rehabilitation. It may be a viable tool to help you with your recovery and healing. Labor Day beach update

The days of the summer of 2024 may be dwindling, but here in St. Johns County, the beach season continues year-round. Beachgoers, however, can expect somewhat of a slowdown as changes go into effect after Labor Day:

Local schools have already resumed for the 2023-24 academic year and schools in northern states will soon resume. The Labor Day holiday traditionally marks the end of the busy summer beach season and it will conclude seasonal lifeguard tower staffing provided by St. Johns County Fire Rescue. Although lifeguard towers will no longer be staffed, mobile truck patrols supplemented by career Fire Rescue personnel will continue in the various beach zones through September.

There are approximately twelve miles of St. Johns County Beaches that allow vehicular access which is permitted year-round. During the months of May

through October, access is limited to the hours of 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Annual driving passes are available for purchase. Daily fees are \$10 from March through September. Tolls continue to be collected on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays through September 30.

Beach gates will continue to be closed from 7:30 p.m. to 8 a.m. daily through October 31 or until the last turtle nest is hatched, whichever occurs later.

• Beach patrons are reminded to utilize the 911 system throughout the year for any emergency occurring on the beaches. These emergencies will continue to receive a Fire Rescue response. Sea Turtle Report

They keep coming and going—slowly! Thousands of sea turtle hatchlings have already abandoned their nests along St. Johns County beaches and have scurried to the Atlantic Ocean to begin their lives, seeking food and safe travel modes. Early August statistics report a total of 841 nests along county beaches with 613 on north beaches, 152 on Anastasia Island and 66 at Matanzas Inlet South. Of those numbers, 179 nests have hatched, sending 15,864 hatchlings to sea. The hatchlings will face a gauntlet of predators, such as shore birds, ghost crabs, and insects. During the first year after hatching, many species of sea turtles are rarely seen. This first year is nown as the "unknown year." It's estimated that only one in a thousand will survive to adulthood because of dangers they will encounter.

The sea turtle season ends on October 31, or until the last nest is hatched. Beach front visitors and residents are reminded to be vigilant about lighting. All beachfront properties are required to reduce the impact of interior and exterior lighting which may impact nesting sea turtles.
